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Biographical Notes

Dr. Patricia Nez-Henderson Dr. Nez Henderson was the first American Indian Woman to Graduate from Yale University.

Dr. Patricia Nez Henderson's grandfather was a Navajo medicine man, and many patients would travel long distances to see him. Dr. Nez Henderson is carrying on the family tradition by working to improve the health of wider communities as well as individual patients, as a public health physician specializing in the health care of American Indians.

Dr. Harry Lando, PHD

Dr. Lando received the 2006 University of Minnesota Award for Global Engagement for his international work in global tobacco reduction. This award carries with it the title of Distinguished International Professor. He has been active in the field of smoking cessation since 1969. Dr. Lando's main areas of research interest are in global tobacco reduction issues, smoking intervention and public policy changes relevant to smoking.
